



### Impact of pupil premium Funding 2015 - 2016

Last year we received £32260.00 in funding. Please see last year's spending proposal for a breakdown of expenditure.

This funding is intended to benefit students on free school meals, children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months, look after children and service children. The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way of ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.


The government believes that it is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium, allocated to schools per eligible pupil, is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility. Whilst schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium, they are held accountable for how they have used the additional funding to support pupils from low-income families. From September 2012, the government required schools to publish online information about how they have used, and are using, the Premium. This will ensure that parents and others are made fully aware of the attainment of pupils covered by the premium.

We are increasingly narrowing the gap between pupils eligible for pupil premium and those that are not. Small numbers of pupil premium children can provide false indicators and so the numbers of pupils eligible in each year group need to be taken into account.

Headlines:

- At the end of Key Stage 2 disadvantaged pupils outperform others both nationally and in school.
- At the end of Key Stage 2 the proportion of disadvantaged pupils who meet the required standard (reading, writing and maths combined) is above those who are not disadvantaged nationally.


5/7 pupil premium children are out of catchment. Attendance is a factor for several of these children.

As this is a significant group these pupils will be carefully tracked through the school to ensure that they make accelerated progress.


#### Next Steps:

Increase rigour in tracking and continue to act upon attendance issues.



Children eligible for pupil premium funding performed better on the phonics screening test than other pupils. This is a reversal of the previous years.




There are minimal gaps between pupils for reading but writing no pupils eligible for pupil premium managed to reach the expected standard in writing.

There are only 2 eligible pupils in the cohort one of which is also SEN.

### Next Steps

Provide improved targeted support/intervention for writing and maths and ensure that progress is tracked rigorously for these pupils.



This again was a small cohort of pupil premium children with only 2 being eligible. This makes the percentages seem like there is a wide gap between the two groups of pupils especially for reading and maths.
